Covid-19

At the moment the State Government has continued with the development of its new planning regulations. There are many community groups that are calling for a slowing of this implementation and closer scrutiny but it is unlikely that a slowdown will occur. The basic premise for development in South Australia is population growth. The assumption is that more people will provide a continuing stimulus to our economy.

This will see pressure being put onto the State's housing needs with an ever increasing high density city developing.

There have been many factors that have affected the way Covid-19 has impacted the

planet but one major aspect is the way in which the high population density zones have suffered in a way that South Australia has not.

Fast action by the State Government has worked but would it have been as successful if we were racked and stacked like people in some of those overseas cities?

Drain Works

Many of you walking the path between the Wetlands and the Army Barracks will have noticed activity behind the Wetlands Information Centre by contractors.

Workers are reinforcing and relining the section of the drain that runs under the pond towards The Parade. This has required new reinforcement rods to be installed and concrete spraying of the lining.

Heritage Sign

The recent installation by Marion Council of the new sign at the western end of the Oaklands Estate Reserve car park detailing the history of the Oaklands Homestead and surrounding trees is most welcome.

David Jarman from the Marion Historical Society made a significant contribution to the preparation of the information displayed for which we thank him sincerely.

David's book "The History of 'Oaklands' and Its Tragic End" can be purchased for \$10 from City of Marion Administration Centre, 245 Sturt Road, Sturt and is an excellent insight into how the home came to be built and the lives of the four families who lived there from 1843 to 1948. It also includes some wonderful photographs.



Street Trees

It was heartening to observe over the warmer months the regular watering of new street trees by the City of Marion truck carrying Wetlands water for the job. With a wet winter to get them fully established this will give them an added boost.

Verge Tidy-Up

Our thanks go to the Marion Council staff members who recently undertook a tidy up of the verge between The Parade and The Parade West. The new plantings along this strip of land adjacent the Wetlands are doing well.

Footpaths

Thanks to everyone who reported unsafe footpaths (tripping hazards and the like) to Marion Council during May. We have already seen works to repair some of those reported with the remainder a work in progress. A great initiative by Council.

Next financial year the drive will be to repair any of the kerbs and pedestrian slipways that are identified.

NEW RECYCLING FACILITY

In March 2020 the Southern Region Waste Resource Authority (SRWRA) announced that Marion, Holdfast and Onkaparinga Councils will jointly build a new material recycling facility at SRWRA's existing Seaford Heights resource recovery and landfill site.

This new plant is expected to be operational in 2021 providing a facility for recyclables to be re-processed and manufactured locally, as well as creating approximately 20 full time equivalent jobs depending on the level of automation. It is estimated 30,000 tonnes of recyclable materials per annum will be processed with scope to increase to 60,000 tonnes if needed. It will also allow Councils to sort different types of waste and to look for more useful ways of re-use rather than sending it to landfill.

The project will be funded by the three Councils, hopefully with support from State and Federal Governments, and will deliver better outcomes for the environment whilst maximising a return on investment. The effective recycling and reuse of our own waste without the need to ship these materials overseas will be a huge win and will put Councils in a strong position to manage waste efficiently and have greater control over how materials are recycled.



Recently SRWRA completed a separate joint venture which has resulted in all General waste (red lidded bins) going through an initial sorting process which removes all organic matter. This has resulted in a significant amount of waste being diverted from landfill. The organic material is composted on site and is being used as capping material. SRWRA had to previously buy capping material. This organic material is heavy so a much lower waste levy fees (currently \$140 per tonne) is paid to the State Government.

In addition SRAWRA has a water storage project, a large solar array on the current building and is undertaking a small solar farm as well as the new recycling facility. This is good news for our environment and well done to these Councils for their initiative.
